FROM THE PASTOR—

"Are we lost?"

I promised I would share this story. A few weeks ago Judy Bryan, Lynn Kinney and I set out on an unexpected journey. We were carpooling to a mission planning meeting at First English Lutheran in Zelienople. Our journey began as many do, with the simple press of a button on the GPS. My first mistake was typing in the wrong church. Already running behind we arrived at Zion Lutheran Church. The name of our destination I would later remember was First English. "This isn't right," I said. "I don't think we are in Zelienople," Judy chimed in from the back. Shortly after stopping the car, Pastor Blair Morgan called to see where we were. "We are at the wrong church," I said. After he assured me that we were only 5 minutes away we were confident we would be there soon. I typed in the name of the church, English Lutheran, and we were off. "Are you sure you know where you are going now," Lynn asked. About 30 minutes later and after several good chuckles from my passengers I called Pr. Morgan to say we had somehow ended up in Butler. Finally, an hour and ten minutes late we arrived at our destination. Only to be greeted with applause and laughter. We set off on a journey that should have taken 25 minutes. We traveled to two churches whose names were not even close to the First English Lutheran Church in Zelienople. This was to be our final meeting as a collection of churches working toward mission planning. I learned a few things that night. One always double check where you are going. Two, if you are lost its better to be with friends. Needless to say this is one memory I will not forget.

As travelers on the journey of life we often use the phrase, "this isn't where I'm supposed to be!" When we look at our lives we sometimes reflect from the starting point to where we are. Our thoughts are often the same, "I should have accomplished more," "shouldn't I have more money in the bank," "I guess I never really took the time to _____," "I thought God would have given me better directions."

Many times in Gods story we read accounts where God sends someone on a journey. Abraham was sent to a new land with a new promise. Moses was sent into the wilderness with no map and a whole lot of back seat drivers. Prophets were sent to speak of justice, truth and hope to people who were less than welcoming at times. Ruth was sent to a new place with a new family. David was sent into battle. Daniel was sent to the lion's den. Jesus was sent to us. When we were baptized we were sent out. Where to? How will we know when we get there? What do I do when I get there? Do I travel alone?

CLAIMING SPIRITUAL GROWTH

For only He can look deep into our mind, heart, and soul and determine what is there and what is not. How often do we hear people proclaim their own spiritual growth and determine that they are spiritually fit? They have determined that because they rise in the morning and recite a few memorized formal prayers followed by a hearty amen that they are fit for the day. Show the world who rules the football world!








