understand God, the way we understand the world around us, and how we contemplate our life and death. Above all; Easter answers the now and later questions. What happens after I die? What happens now, in the sadness? In the separation? In the midst of sin and in the hope of something more?

Friends in Christ, Easter reminds us that in our lives, in the midst of searching for answers we often find ourselves looking for Jesus in the wrong place. "Why do you search for the living among the dead?" We can sometimes allow our pain, despair, sadness, addictions, worries, guilt, and uncertainties rule over us like a sealed tomb. It looks like there is no way out, this must be the end. Jesus broke the chains which hold us to doubt. He tore the veil of separation between us and the Father, and he triumphed over sin and death! Alleluia! Christ is Risen!

ALC Council Meeting Highlights

Council meeting was held Tuesday Mar 14, 2023

- Motion to amend minutes from February. Two yes,
 8 no, 2 abstain. Motion fails.
- John motions to approve as written. All in favor.
 1 abstain. Motion carries.
- Motion to approve Tyler and Jackie Hoffman as members. All in favor. Motion carries.
- Motion to approve additional two weeks of sabbatical for Pastor Murdy, starting May 18. All in favor. 1 no, and 1 abstain. Motion carries.
- Motion to amend to have pastor use two weeks of vacation for the two weeks after May 18. Motion is not seconded. Amendment fails.
- Roberts Rules of Order and future procedures: motion to create a time limit of 5 minutes per speaker during debate. All in favor. Motion carries.
- Review of survey and motion to move forward with paintings.
- Motion to utilize \$6,000 gift from the cemetery fund and \$3,000 from the Memorial Fund to pay for commission of paintings. 8 yes, 1 no, 2 abstain. Motion carries.
- Property to make decision on vendor. Special project "other fund" March 19th to May 14th to go towards HVAC. Motion for property committee to approve vendor for repair ductless system. All in favor. Motion carries.
- Motion to adjourn. Seconded. Motion fails.
- Secretary read letter (added to the minutes) to address conflict, behavior at congregational meeting.
- Fellowship, Social Ministry and Evangelism: Quarterly meetings, 6/11, 9/24, & 11/5.
- Personnel: Betty Kallay, Greg Thompson, and Jamie Cropper appointed for evaluation team for pastor. and put forward for approval at council.
 Motion for appointment. All in favor. Motion carries.
- Next meeting Tuesday April 11.
- Motion to adjourn. All in favor. 8:55 p.m.

Coordinator needed for April 23 Road Clean-up event!

Did you know that Ascension has an Adopt-A-Highway? Our stretch runs from the start of Beaver Grade Road by the BP (there is a sign) and winds all the way down to where the trucks park across from Ventana Hills. This humble stretch of road is ours to keep clean of trash. Some could tell you stories of things we have found!

We are looking for a Road Clean-up Coordinator - just one person or family who can arrange and lead our Beaver Grade Road clean up that happens once or twice a year.

LESSER FESTIVALS & commemorations

April 4 Benedict the African

Confessor d. 1589

Born a slave on the island of Sicily, Benedict first lived as a hermit and labored as a plowman after he was freed. When the bishop of Rome ordered all hermits to attach themselves to a religious community, Benedict joined the Franciscans, where he served as a cook. Although he was illiterate, his fame as a confessor brought many visitors to the humble and holy cook, and he was eventually named superior of the community. A patron saint of African Americans, Benedict is remembered for his patience and understanding when confronted with racial prejudice and taunts.

April 6 Albrecht Dürer, d. 1528; Matthias Grünewald, d. 1529; Lucas Cranach, d. 1553 Artists

These great artists revealed through their work the mystery of salvation and the wonder of creation. Dürer's work reflected the apocalyptic spirit of his time. Though he remained a Roman Catholic, he was sympathetic to Martin Luther's reforming work. Grünewald's paintings are known for their dramatic forms, vivid colors, and depiction of light. Cranach's work includes many fine religious examples and several portraits of Martin Luther. Cranach was also widely known for his woodcuts.

April 9 Dietrich Bonhoeffer

Theologian, d. 1945

Bonhoeffer was a German theologian who wrote profoundly, yet in an accessible manner. In the Second World War, he became a leader of the Confessing Church in Germany that resisted the Nazi movement. Linked to a plot to kill Hitler, he was hanged shortly before the end of the war.

April 10 Mikael Agricola

Bishop of Turku, d. 1557

Consecrated bishop of Turku, Finland, without the approval of the pope, Agricola began a reform along Lutheran lines. In only three years, he translated the New Testament and worship texts into Finnish, in the process establishing the rules of Finnish writing that are still used today.

April 19 Olavus Petri, priest, d.1552; Laurentius Petri, Bishop of Uppsala, d.1573; Renewers of the church

These two brothers studied with Luther at the University of Wittenberg and then returned to their native Sweden to introduce the Lutheran reforms. Olavus published a catechism and hymnal; Laurentius was a professor who defended the office of bishop and later became one.

April 21 Anselm

Bishop of Canterbury d. 1109

This eleventh- and twelfth-century Benedictine This eleventh-century monk was one of the greatest theologians of the Middle Ages. He is remembered for emphasizing the maternal aspects of God, and for the theory that the Son of God became human in order to make the necessary payment for our sin.

April 23 Toyohiko Kagawa Renewer of society d. 1960

Born in Kobe, Japan, Kagawa was orphaned as a young child. Later, when he became Christian, he was disowned by the rest of his family. Wishing to bring Christian principles into society, he worked among poor people, established schools and hospitals, and worked for peace.

April 25 Mark Evangelist

Though Mark himself was not an apostle, it is likely that he was a member of one of the early Christian communities. It is possible that he is the John Mark of Acts 12 whose mother owned the house where the apostles gathered. The gospel attributed to him is brief and direct. It is considered by many to be the earliest gospel.

April 29 Catherine of Siena

Theologian d. 1380

A member of the Order of Preachers (Dominicans), Catherine was the first woman among Roman Catholics to receive the title Doctor of the Church. She was a contemplative and is known for her mystical visions of Jesus. Catherine was a humanitarian who worked to alleviate the suffering of the poor and imprisoned. She was also a renewer of church and society.


