From Pastor Murdy's Desk

here is something about January 1st that makes things new. New Years Eve is full of fun traditions. Maybe you have a group of friends that always gets together or unique family customs that are necessary to uphold if the

new year is going to be full of good things. At the Murdy house we make little sandwiches. We spend hours cutting bread into various shapes, coloring cream cheese and decorating each sandwich - only to be eaten shortly after they are admired. As we gather with friends, family or perhaps turn in early in the comfort of our home one thing is certain - the new year will be different.

The stroke of midnight is a kind of reset button! We all have humble ambitions of change. "I want to lose weight," "Less sweets," "new job," or "go to church more." We all want the new year to be different and somehow better or improved from the last. How do we do that? Where do we begin? Every one of us are different and the steps it takes to bring about positive change are different. I think the best advice I can give when it comes to wanting positive change is to not do it alone. Ask someone to be with you, to help keep you accountable. Most of all to encourage you and cheer you on!

Although there may be lots of steps and sacrifices that lead to the various kinds of change, we crave more. Something permanent and deep. If this is the kind of change you are looking for, the answer can be found in Jesus. As Christian disciples we ought to be actively engaged in our relationship with Jesus at all times. It should be part of our nature, seen in every action and heard through every word. Alas, we all fall short of this expectation. We call this sin. Christ wants nothing more than a willing heart and an eagerness to love. Our life can be different, that's a promise. That being said, there is no guarantee that life will be easy or without pain. John writes in the book of Revelation about this newness we have in Christ: "And the one who was seated on the throne said, "See, I am making all things new."



WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY JANUARY 18-25, 2024

The idea of a period of prayer for Christian unity originated in a conversation of Father Paul James Wattson with an English clergyman, Rev. Spencer Jones. In 1907, Rev. Jones suggested that a day be set aside for prayer for Christian unity. Fr. Wattson agreed with the concept but offered the idea of an octave of prayer between the Feast of St. Peter's Chair on January 18 and the Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul on January 25.


Today the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity belongs to all Christians who are sincerely interested in the fulfillment of Christ's prayer "that all may be one." It is sponsored by the Commission on Faith and Order of the World Council of Churches and the Pontifical Discastery for the Promotion of Christian Unity. LESSER FESTIVALS & commemorations

January 1 The Name of Jesus

By Jewish law, every baby boy was circumcised and named on the eighth day of life, so on the eighth day of Christmas the church celebrates this event in Jesus' life. The keeping of the covenant as well as Jesus' name are signs of God's salvation given to us through him.

January 2 Johann Konrad Wilhelm Loehe

renewer of the church, d. 1872

A nineteenth-century German Lutheran pastor, Loehe worked to enliven the church with the eucharist at its center, from which would flow evangelism and social ministry. He sent pastors to North America, Australia, New Guinea, Brazil, and Ukraine.

January 15 Martin Luther King Jr.

renewer of society, martyr, d.1968

An American prophet of justice among races and nations, King was an eloquent preacher, a leader of the nonviolent resistance to race-segregated society, and recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964. Born on this date, he was assassinated on April 4, 1968.

January 17 Antony of Egypt

renewer of the church, d. ca. 356

One of the earliest of the Egyptian desert fathers, Antony gave away his sizeable inheritance and became a hermit. Later he became leader of a group of monks who devoted themselves to prayer, worship, and labor.

January 17 Pachomius

renewer of the church, d. 346

Born in Egypt, Pachomius became a Christian while a soldier. He became a hermit (a solitary monk) and organized others into a religious community. His rule for monasteries influenced later ones in both the Eastern and Western churches.

January 18 Confession of Peter

• Week of Prayer for Christian Unity Begins •

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is framed by two commemorations, the Confession of Peter (a relatively recent addition to the calendar) and the older Conversion of Paul. Both apostles are remembered together on June 29, but these two days give us an opportunity to focus on key events in each of their lives. Today we remember that Peter was led by God's grace to acknowledge Jesus as "the Christ, the Son of the living God" (Matt. 16:16). This confession is the common confession that unites us with Peter and with all Christians of every time and place.

January 19 Henry, Bishop of Uppsala *martyr, d.1156* When Erik, King of Sweden, determined to invade Finland for

the purpose of converting the people there to Christianity, Henry went with him. Henry is recognized as the patron saint of Finland.

January 21 Agnes martyr, d. ca. 304

Agnes was a girl of about thirteen living in Rome. The details of her martyrdom are not clear, but she gave witness to her faith and was put to death as a result, most likely by the sword. The church has honored her as one of the chief martyrs of her time.

January 25 Conversion of Paul

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity Ends

The week of prayer begun by the remembrance of Peter's confession now comes to an end as we recall the pivotal moment in the life of the other pillar of the early church, the apostle Paul. His encounter with the risen Christ turned him from persecutor of the followers of Christ to one of their leaders.

January 26 Timothy, Titus and Silas missionaries

These three early Christian men were missionary companions of the apostle Paul. Timothy became bishop of Ephesus, Titus bishop of Crete, and Silas was imprisoned with Paul at Philippi until they were delivered by an earthquake.

January 27 Lydia, Dorcas and Phoebe


witnesses to the faith

Women as well as men were important Christian leaders from the beginning, as demonstrated by these coworkers of the apostle Paul. Lydia, a seller of purple goods, lent her home for a church; Dorcas was known for charitable works; Phoebe was a deacon in the church at Cenchrae.

January 28 Thomas Aquinas teacher, d. 1274

Thomas Aquinas was a brilliant and creative theologian of the thirteenth century. He was first and foremost a student of the Bible and profoundly concerned with the theological formation of the church's ordained ministers. As a member of the Order of Preachers (Dominicans), he worked to correlate scripture with the philosophy of Aristotle, which was having a renaissance in Aquinas's day. Some students of Aristotle's philosophy found in it an alternative to Christianity. But Aquinas immersed himself in the thought of Aristotle and worked to explain Christian beliefs in the philosophical culture of the day.
