From Pastor's desk

Now that the season of Easter has drawn to a close, we jump right into the feasts of Pentecost and the Holy Trinity. These two unique Sundays, as well as Ascension and the 7-week long season of Easter give us an opportunity to focus on our creeds and what we believe. Through the Easter season we recite the Nicene Creed which expresses more detail about the life of Jesus and the Holy Spirit. We do this during Advent and Christmas as well. On Holy Trinity we recite the Athanasian Creed (the long one) which teaches us the most about God in three persons.

Sunday, June 5th is Pentecost Sunday. Our liturgy on this day reminds us that Pentecost is a day of promises fulfilled. The promised Spirit of God is poured out. The baptized have become "children of God" and "joint heirs with Christ." By the power of the Spirit we have seen the face of the Father in his only begotten Son and been saved by him.

If you ever want to know more or understand what we believe as Lutheran-Christians, you need look no further than Luther's Small or Large Catechism. The foundation of our faith is the belief that God exists as Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The Holy Trinity (Trinity Sunday just happens to be the next Sunday, June 12th). The Trinity is one of the greatest, most perplexing and fundamental mysteries of our faith as Christians. Believing in

Council meeting was held Tuesday May 10, 2022

- Motion to approve Confirmation students to be confirmed. All in favor.

the Trinity is what makes us unique from the other monotheistic (believing in ONE God) faiths, i.e. Islam and Judaism. We believe that God revels Himself through creation and human history but most especially through the Incarnation of Christ, his death on the cross and his resurrection. Finally, God is revealed through the church as we are led and supported by the Holy Spirit.

Luther begins to teach this great mystery as a basic and fundamental belief for the church through the Apostle's Creed. Each of our three creeds have three parts (which we call articles). Article I, God the Father. Article II, God the Son. Article III, God the Holy Spirit.

Martin Luther teaches us: "I believe that God has created me together with all that exist. God has given me and still preserves my body and soul: eyes, ears, and all limbs and senses; reason and all mental faculties. In addition, God daily and abundantly provides shoes, clothing, food and drink, house and farm, spouse and children, fields, livestock, and all property - along with all the necessities and nourishment for this body and life..." First and foremost, we acknowledge God as our Father and Creator. The ONE who gives us life and supports that life with all that we need. Everything we have comes from God. Everything is God-given! Everything! Our sight, sense, and soul! Our clothing, property and family! Luther teaches us that God does all of this out of pure fatherly grace- in other words, just because he loves us! How do we respond to these kinds of gifts?

"...For all of this I owe it to God to thank and praise, serve and obey him." As Christians we must constantly and daily evaluate how we respond to God's gracious gifts to us. To live a life of thanks is to recognize life as a precious gift. How do you thank God? Do you care for others? Give of yourself? Commit your life to one of prayer? How do you praise God? Do you offer praise with your life, regular worship, or in studying scripture? How do you serve God? When you serve is it with generous hearts and hands, time and talent, treasure and trust? How do you obey God? Do you honor God in your heart - loving and serving only God? Do you put God first above all else? Do you love one another as God has loved you?

As we begin this great season of Summer, let us be mindful of our beliefs as a community of faith and how we live out those beliefs in the world around us. To believe in God is to acknowledge that we are not alone and that by ourselves we can do nothing. God gives us life and daily sustains that life with all we need.

Let us live thankfully!

LESSER FESTIVALS & commemorations

June 1 - Justin, d.ca. 165 martyr at Rome

Born of pagan parents, Justin was influenced by an elderly Christian in Ephesus. He became a teacher of philosophy and the Christian faith. Jailed for practicing an unauthorized religion, he refused to renounce his faith and was beheaded.

June 3 - John XXIII, Bishop of Rome, d. 1963

When elected pope, the former Angelo Roncalli was expected to be a short-term caretaker. He showed great spirit, though, and convened the Second Vatican Council which helped bring great changes to Roman Catholic and other churches.

June 3 - The Martyrs of Uganda, d. 1886

On June 3, 1886, thirty-two young men were burned to death for refusing to renounce Christianity. The confident manner in which these Christians went to their deaths contributed to a much stronger Christian presence in Uganda.

June 5 - Boniface, Bishop of Mainz, d. 754

missionary to Germany, martyr

Boniface was a native of England who became a Benedictine monk and was called to missionary work among the Vandal tribes of Germany. With fellow workers, he established churches and schools, and he also worked to reform the church.

June 7 - Seattle, chief of the Duwamish Confederacy, d. 1866

Noah Seattle led a coalition of tribes, and convinced them to live peacefully with encroaching white settlers. When he became a Roman Catholic, he held morning and evening prayer with his tribe. The city of Seattle is named for him.

June 9 - Columba, d. 597; Aidan, d. 651; Bede, d. 735

renewers of the church

These three monks from the British Isles helped keep the light of learning alive during the Middle Ages. Columba founded three monasteries off the coast of Scotland. Aidan was a pastor who led people to works of charity. The Venerable Bede was a Bible translator, historian, and hymnwriter.

June 11 - Barnabas, Apostle

Barnabas was not numbered among the twelve apostles, but the book of Acts gives him that title. After Paul was converted to Christianity, Barnabas welcomed him to Jerusalem, and later the two traveled together on missionary journeys.

June 14 - Basil the Great, Bishop of Caesarea, d. 379; Gregory, Bishop of Nyssa, d.ca. 385; Gregory of Nazianzus, Bishop of Constantinople, d.ca. 389; Macrina, theologian, d.ca. 379

The Cappadocian fathers, as the three men in this group are known, explored the mystery of the Holy Trinity. Basil's monastic rule forms the basis for Eastern monastic life. Gregory of Nazianzus defended orthodox Christianity in Constantinople. Gregory of Nyssa, Basil's younger brother, wrote on the spiritual life. Macrina, older sister of Basil and Gregory of Nyssa, was the leader of a community dedicated to asceticism, meditation, and prayer.

June 17 - The Emanuel Nine, d. 2015 martyrs

On June 17, 2015, nine people gathered for Bible study and prayer at the Emanuel AME Church in Charleston, South Carolina were murdered by a self-professed white supremacist. A resolution to commemorate June 17 as a day of repentance for the martyrdom of the Emanuel Nine was adopted by the Churchwide Assembly of the ELCA on August 8, 2019.

June 21 - Onesimos Nesib, d. 1931 translator, evangelist

Onesimos was born in Ethiopia. Captured and taken as a slave to Eritrea, he was there freed by Swedish missionaries. He translated the Bible into his native Oromo and returned to preach there.

June 24 - John the Baptist

John said, "[Jesus] must increase, but I must decrease." And so his birth is celebrated half a year before Jesus', just as the daylight in the northern hemisphere begins to wane. Jesus honored John as being the greatest prophet.

June 25

Philipp Melanchthon, d. 1560 renewer of the church

Though he died on April 19, Philipp Melanchthon is commemorated today because of his connection with the Augsburg Confession. Colleague and co-reformer with Martin Luther, Melanchthon was a brilliant scholar and popular professor, known as "the teacher of Germany."

Presentation of the Augsburg Confession, 1530

On June 25, 1530 the German and Latin editions of the Augsburg Confession were presented to the Roman Emperor Charles. The Augsburg Confession, written by Philipp Melanchthon and endorsed by Martin Luther, consists of a brief summary of points in which the reformers saw their teaching as either agreeing with or differing from that of the Roman Catholic Church of the time.

June 27 - Cyril, Bishop of Alexandria, d. 444

Cyril defended the orthodox teachings about the person of Christ. After a conflict involving all of the major Christian leaders of the time, it was decided that Cyril's interpretation, that Christ's person included both divine and human natures, was correct.

June 28 - Irenaeus, Bishop of Lyons, d.ca. 202

This important early church leader tried very hard to hold to the faith handed down by the apostles. An opponent of the movement known as gnosticism, Irenaeus was one of the first to speak of the church as catholic, or linked together.

June 29 - Peter and Paul, Apostles

These two apostles are the pillars of the church in the first generation after Christ. One of the Twelve, Peter both offered a glorious confession of faith and later denied knowing Jesus. Paul once led the persecution of Christians, then was converted and helped bring the faith to non-Jewish people.


