

## WHY do we go to church?



### From Pastor's desk

ike many routines in our life, it is important every now and then to ask the question, "Why do I do what I do?" Sometimes it can weed out unhealthy habits. Other times it can strengthen and reaffirm what helps us to become better versions of ourselves. So, the question I want us to consider is, why do you go to church?

There are precious few opportunities for me as a pastor to go to church. I know that sounds funny. But it is true. On Sunday morning I have a job to do. As a leader of a community of faith I am

called to preach, lead worship, foster faith and relationships, and administer the sacraments. That does not mean that I do not also worship. As your pastor, I worship our Lord right alongside you.

Throughout the year there are a few special opportunities which I personally have to worship and I do take them very seriously. Every year I attend the annual chapter of Lutheran Franciscans where we worship several times throughout the day (Liturgy of the Hours). In the fall, I



Our "Other" collection to replace our "legacy" boiler is chugging **very** slowly toward its goal . . .

Total project cost: \$22,800. We've already paid \$7,600 (one-third down) using previously donated funds for special projects to lock in this price, and thus will still owe \$15,200 when the project is completed at the end of September.

Since our Boiler Campaign began this year in mid-March, \$2,245 has been donated and earmarked for this project by members and friends via the "Other" designation on Sunday giving envelopes, as well as several mail-in donations. Combined with monies currently available in our special projects fund, we are only \$7,200 short of our goal!

SO - Empty those piggy-banks and let's fulfill this goal by September's end!

8 weeks X \$900/week = \$7,200 . . . totally doable, right? YES! We can do it!

## Peace in the presence of our Lord

Each of us has our own way of worshipping our Lord in addition to attending church. We listen and learn through bible study and use of additional Christian teaching aids. The little daily reading booklets are one way .... they express experiences, advice, suggestions – written by pastors of churches nationwide.

My most treasured aid is my little brown book, written in the first person. And that person is Jesus. "Jesus Calling: Enjoying Peace in His Presence" by Sarah Young provides me with a daily conversation with our Lord. He teaches us, shows His love for us, thanks us, leads us, and yes, even admonishes us. Share a conversation with Him.

"Learn to enjoy life more. Relax, remembering that I am God with you. I crafted you with enormous capacity to know Me and enjoy My presence. When My people wear sour faces and walk through their lives with resigned rigidity, I am displeased. When you walk through a day with childlike delight, savoring every blessing, you proclaim your trust in Me, your ever-present Shepherd. The more you focus on My presence with you, the more fully you can enjoy life. Glorify Me through your pleasure in Me. Thus, you proclaim My presence to the watching world."

## LESSER FESTIVALS & commemorations

### August 8 - Dominic, d. 1221 founder of the Order of

Preachers (Dominicans)

Dominic was a Spanish priest who saw the wealth of the clergy as a stumbling block for the church, so he formed a movement, the Order of Preachers (commonly called Dominicans) devoted to itinerant preaching and living in poverty.

#### August 10 - Lawrence, d.258 deacon, martyr

As one of the seven deacons of the church at Rome, Lawrence was responsible for the church's financial matters and for the care of the poor. Asked by the emperor to gather the church's treasure, he presented a collection of orphans, lepers, and the like. The enraged emperor Valerian had him put to death.

August 11 - Clare of Assisi d. 1253 Abbess of San Damiano At age eighteen, Clare of Assisi heard Francis preach a sermon in a church in town. From that time, she determined to follow in his example of Christian living. With Francis's help (and against the wishes of her father) she and a growing number of companions established a women's Franciscan community, called the Order of Poor Ladies, or Poor Clares. She became a confidante and advisor to Francis, and in standing up against the wishes of popes for the sake of maintaining complete poverty, she helped inspire other women to pursue spiritual goals.

### August 13 - Florence Nightingale d. 1910; Clara Maass d. 1901 renewers of the church

**Nightingale** was born in England, and horrified her wealthy family by deciding to become a nurse. Trained at Kaiserswerth, Germany, with a Lutheran order of deaconesses, she led a group of nurses in ministering in the midst of the Crimean War, and worked for hospital reform. **Maass**, a native of New Jersey, also was a war nurse, and volunteered as a subject for research on yellow fever. She died of the disease.

### August 14 - Maximilian Kolbe, d. 1941; Kaj Munk, d. 1944; *martyrs*

Kolbe was a Franciscan priest, born Raymond Kolbe. After spending some time working in Asia, he returned in 1936 to his native Poland, where he supervised a friary that came to house thousands of Polish war refugees, mostly Jews. The Nazis were watching, however, and he was arrested. Confined in Auschwitz, Kolbe gave generously of his meager resources and finally volunteered to be starved to death in place of another man who was a husband and father. After two weeks, he was executed by a lethal injection.

Munk, a Danish Lutheran pastor and playwright, was an outspoken critic of the Nazis, who occupied Denmark during the Second World War. His plays frequently highlighted the eventual victory of the Christian faith despite the church's weak and ineffective witness. The Nazis feared Munk because his sermons and articles helped to strengthen the Danish resistance movement. He was executed by the Gestapo on January 5, 1944.

### August 15 - Mary, Mother of Our Lord

The church (including Martin Luther) honors Mary with the Greek title *Theotokos*, meaning God-bearer. Origen first used this title in the early church, and the councils of Ephesus and Chalcedon upheld it. Luther upheld this same title in his writings. The honor paid to Mary as *Theotokos* and mother of our Lord goes back to biblical times, when Mary herself sang, "from now on all generations will call me blessed" (Luke 1:48). Mary's life revealed the presence of God incarnate, and it revealed God's presence among the humble and poor. Mary's song, the Magnificat, speaks of reversals in the reign of God: the mighty are cast down, the lowly are lifted up, the hungry are fed, and the rich are sent away empty-handed.

#### August 20 - Bernard, Abbot of Clairvaux, d. 1153

A Cistercian monk, Bernard was a man of great spirituality who wrote mystical works and criticized those whom he thought took an overly intellectual approach to the faith. He became an abbot, and wrote several hymns that are still beloved today.

#### August 24 - Bartholomew Apostle

Mentioned as one of Jesus' disciples in Matthew, Mark, and Luke, Bartholomew's name is replaced in John's gospel by Nathanael, leading many to believe that the two are different names for the same person. Little is known about his work, though some traditions place him later in India or Armenia.

August 28 - Augustine, Bishop of Hippo, d. 430 Augustine was one of the greatest theologians of the Western church. Born in North Africa, he was a philosophy student in Carthage, where he later became a teacher of rhetoric. Much of his young life was a debauched one. As an adult he came under the influence of Ambrose, the bishop of Milan, and through him came to see Christianity as a religion appropriate for a philosopher. Augustine was baptized by Ambrose at the Easter Vigil in 387. He was ordained four years later and made bishop of Hippo in 396. Augustine was a defender of the Christian faith and argued, against the Donatists, that the holiness of the church did not depend on the holiness of its members, particularly the clergy, but that holiness comes from Christ, the head of the church. Augustine's autobiography, *Confessions*, tells of his slow movement toward faith and includes the line "Late have I loved thee."

August 28 - Moses the Black d.ca. 400 monk, martyr Converted from life as a thief and a robber to Christianity, Moses was an Ethiopian who became a desert monk at Skete. The change in his heart and life had a profound impact on his native country. He was murdered when Berber bandits attacked his monastery.

## Pastor Joe: serving God, serving those who serve

My two weeks at annual training at Fort Indian Town Gap (July 9-23) was my first true military experience. It was amazing! I learned more than I ever imagined and was grateful to have questions answered, meet new people and learn what it means to serve God and country through military chaplaincy.

About halfway through training, we traveled an hour to Gettysburg. Although I lived there for three years, I had never walked the battlefield the way we did. A few of us stayed back to walk rather than take the tour (the bus broke down...long story). Five of us walked 13 miles from one end of Gettysburg to the other, covering all three days of one of the Civil War's most epic battles.

Along the way we met some re-enactors. With them was a Civil War era chaplain whose endorsing church body is in real life the Episcopal church. It was a great photo opportunity (photo, right) and a humbling moment as I remembered in that moment all the chaplains who have served our men and women in uniform since before Declaration of Independence.

I am grateful for your love and support. I hope you know that I take you all with me when I serve as chaplain. Your love and mission is the love and mission I extend to others. It is going to be a learning experience for us all as we continue to discover what it means to be lean into this bi-vocational ministry of pastor and chaplain.

Moving forward, I will begin serving one weekend a month. We show up on Saturday mornings at 0700 and since I live close, I will get to come home at the end of the day. Sunday will be the same, except I am



excused to lead worship at Ascension and return for duty following church. So, naturally on those Sundays I will be in boots instead of dress shoes! If you have any questions or curiosities, please don't hesitate to ask.

As this new adventure begins, I humbly ask for your prayers and continued support.


