We are One Body in Christ

Pastor Kobert's Desk

As we look with expectant hope to the day we celebrate Jesus' resurrection, we do so and remember that this resurrection was a bodily one. By that, I mean our faith in what God has done in raising Jesus up from the tomb is

that Jesus was not just raised in the spirit, but in physical form. The physical body of Christ was given new life by the Lord of Life, showing the defeat of death and the sin that leads to it.

To prove that this was so to the followers and disciples, Jesus sits and eats with them and invites them to touch him where he was pierced. The body of the risen Christ was present with the disciples in the upper room, it was with the followers on the road to Emmaus, it was in the garden with the women at the tomb. That physical body assured them all that the promise that Jesus had been telling them was real. With this promise being real, so too is the promised sending of the Holy Spirit that unites.

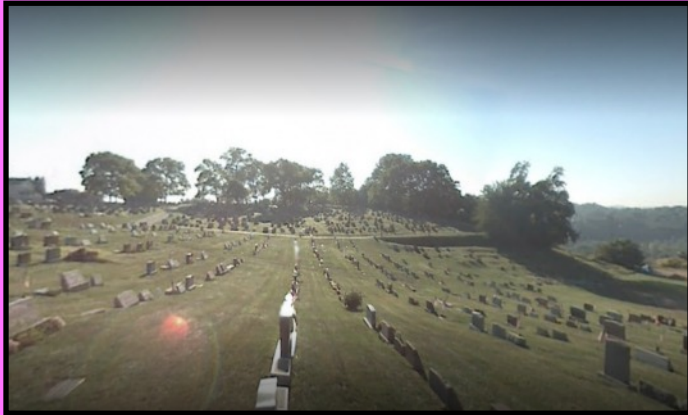
Paul was quick to pick up on this truth and wrote often about it. Then, as now, there were many things that the followers of Christ used to differentiate between one another. Those differentiations were used as justification for creating a sort of hierarchy within the church.

Could the Greeks be followers of Jesus as they were, or did they need to become Jewish first? What was the role of women in the church? Could Gentiles every truly receive the gift that God offers? Who could be true followers of Jesus? Paul had to deal with these questions wherever he went. Some of his answers were directed at the Jewish followers of Christ, and others at the Greek and Gentile followers. But each time he sought to help them to look at one another while considering the body of Christ.

A reflection by Nancy Jacobs

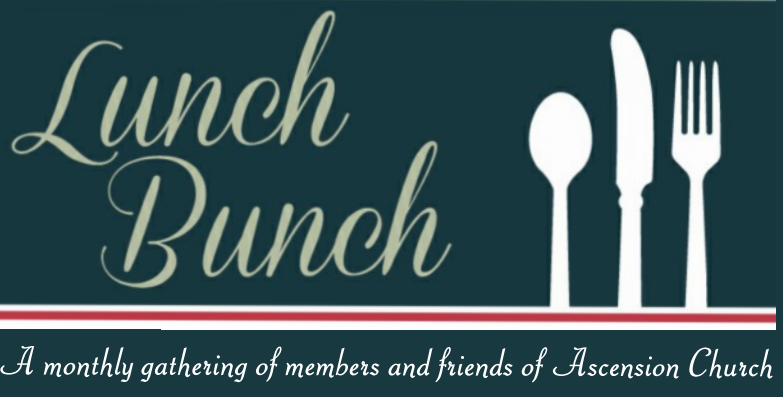

In the letter to the Romans, Paul encourages them to humble themselves, not thinking of themselves more highly than another. For each of us, though many, are one body in Christ. That is, we are all given the gift of the Holy Spirit. The blessings given in that Holy Spirit differ, but all have a place in the body.

In his first letter to the Corinthians, he has states more clearly that we are all baptized into one body, whether we are Jews or Greeks, slave or free. Because of this we cannot dismiss another part of the body of Christ as lesser, for all have a role to play in sharing the gospel.

“Now, you are the body of Christ and individually members of it.” (1 Cor. 12:27)

We are members of this body because of the resurrected body of Christ. Like the resurrected Christ, we are a real and powerful body of believers. Like the scars that marked our Lord’s body, we are physical and in many places. The same power that lifted Christ from the dead was shared with all parts of this body of Christ, now spread throughout the world. That gift of life unites us in purpose and ministry, to share the things that give life to others, just as we were given the gift that gives us life. ■

LESSER FESTIVALS & commemorations

April 4 Benedict the African

Confessor d. 1589

Born a slave on the island of Sicily, Benedict first lived as a hermit and labored as a plowman after he was freed. When the bishop of Rome ordered all hermits to attach themselves to a religious community, Benedict joined the Franciscans, where he served as a cook. Although he was illiterate, his fame as a confessor brought many visitors to the humble and holy cook, and he was eventually named superior of the community. A patron saint of African Americans, Benedict is remembered for his patience and understanding when confronted with racial prejudice and taunts.

April 6 Albrecht Dürer, d. 1528; Matthias

Grünewald, d. 1529; Lucas Cranach, d. 1553

Artists

These great artists revealed through their work the mystery of salvation and the wonder of creation. Dürer's work reflected the apocalyptic spirit of his time. Though he remained a Roman Catholic, he was sympathetic to Martin Luther's reforming work. Grünewald's paintings are known for their dramatic forms, vivid colors, and depiction of light. Cranach's work includes many fine religious examples and several portraits of Martin Luther. Cranach was also widely known for his woodcuts.

April 9 Dietrich Bonhoeffer

Theologian, d. 1945

Bonhoeffer was a German theologian who wrote profoundly, yet in an accessible manner. In the Second World War, he became a leader of the Confessing Church in Germany that resisted the Nazi movement. Linked to a plot to kill Hitler, he was hanged shortly before the end of the war.

April 10 Mikael Agricola

Bishop of Turku, d. 1557

Consecrated bishop of Turku, Finland, without the approval of the pope, Agricola began a reform along Lutheran lines. In only three years, he translated the New Testament and worship texts into Finnish, in the process establishing the rules of Finnish writing that are still used today.

April 19 Olavus Petri, priest, d.1552;

Laurentius Petri, Bishop of Uppsala, d.1573;

Renewers of the church

These two brothers studied with Luther at the University of Wittenberg and then returned to their native Sweden to introduce the Lutheran reforms. Olavus published a catechism and hymnal; Laurentius was a professor who de-fended the office of bishop and later became one.

April 21 Anselm

Bishop of Canterbury d. 1109

This eleventh- and twelfth-century Benedictine This eleventh-century monk was one of the greatest theologians of the Middle Ages. He is remembered for emphasizing the maternal aspects of God, and for the theory that the Son of God became human in order to make the necessary payment for our sin.

April 23 Toyohiko Kagawa

Renewer of society d. 1960

Born in Kobe, Japan, Kagawa was orphaned as a young child. Later, when he became Christian, he was disowned by the rest of his family. Wishing to bring Christian principles into society, he worked among poor people, established schools and hospitals, and worked for peace.

April 25 Mark

Evangelist

Though Mark himself was not an apostle, it is likely that he was a member of one of the early Christian communities. It is possible that he is the John Mark of Acts 12 whose mother owned the house where the apostles gathered. The gospel attributed to him is brief and direct. It is considered by many to be the earliest gospel.

April 29 Catherine of Siena

Theologian d. 1380

A member of the Order of Preachers (Dominicans), Catherine was the first woman among Roman Catholics to receive the title Doctor of the Church. She was a contemplative and is known for her mystical visions of Jesus. Catherine was a humanitarian who worked to alleviate the suffering of the poor and imprisoned. She was also a renewer of church and society.
