Reflecting with Nancy Jacobs

"Suffer the little children...." Or maybe as a church community, we should read that as "the little children suffer." In our surrounding communities there are many degrees of suffering by families - and I use the term indiscriminately - some without a father, some with drug use, some with part-time moms.

The ELCA laments about not having enough young people entering the ministry. Well, is anyone taking enough time to educate or encourage very young children to become involved in the church? I was 5 years old when I started Sunday School (Ruth Beyer was my teacher) and 85+ years later, I'm still around.

Let's not be so busy worrying about what is wrong with the church constitution (of which I admit I am somewhat ignorant but I still manage to worship God), and instead focus on being Lutheran through every age and stage of life. Yes, I am not so happy at the thoughts of a non-Lutheran pastor preaching his/her denomination's beliefs to me, but if we and our church leaders don't foster more fervor and entice the young to take the lead, then we can't really complain about a shortage of Lutheran ministers to carry on.

Now imagine the wonder of a young child who never experienced the friendliness of another young child or a caring adult, or never having been exposed to bible stories, being brought to our Sunday School for the first time. I think the joy – and the rewards – would be two-fold.

There must be some way to open our doors to kids such as these. Please tell me how I can help.

"The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it." With the flick of a light switch, or the lighting of a candle, the darkness is scattered. It seeks to hide behind objects, casting shadows on the far wall. Even this shadow is greatly diminished because of the light that shines. This is what we see in God coming down into the world, that the darkness which Jesus confronts is scattered.

We celebrate at this time of year the season of Advent, of preparation and anticipation. We build up the light each week as a new candle is lit to further scatter the darkness while awaiting the single light of Christ which banishes all darkness. These candles remind us that Christ IS the light, the one who shines in our hearts, who banishes the darkness of sin, and who leads us through the darkness of death and into life.

As you are pulled this way and that by meals, activities, chores, shopping, and work, seek out a bit of time to sit with a lit candle. Watch as the darkness scatters at its lighting and recite this short verse. May its light scatter not only the darkness around you, but within you as well.



Advent Midweek Services

7 p.m. WEDNESDAYS: Dec. 3 10, 17

Join us as we await the newborn King throughout the season of Advent through our midweek services of Holden Evening Prayer. This unique contemplative worship service originally was written during the winter of 1986 while the composer, Marty Haugen, was in residence at Holden Village in the North Cascade mountains of Washington state. A remote wilderness community and retreat center, Holden is rooted in the Lutheran tradition which welcomes all people. Ascension Church has long enjoyed this beautiful service (about 30 mins).

We hope that you will join us on Wednesdays - Dec. 3 10, 17 throughout this sacred Advent season.

LESSER FESTIVALS & commemorations

December 3 - Francis Xavier missionary to Asia d. 1552
Francis Xavier (ZAYV-yehr) was born in the Basque region of northern Spain, later becoming a missionary to India, Southeast Asia, Japan, and the Philippines. At each point he learned the local language and, like Martin Luther, wrote catechisms for the instruction of new converts. Together with Ignatius Loyola and five others, Francis formed the Society of Jesus (Jesuits). Francis spoke out against the Spanish and Portuguese colonists when he discovered their oppression of the indigenous people to whom he was sent as a missionary.

December 4 - John of Damascus theologian, hymnwriter d. ca. 749

Born to a wealthy family in Damascus and well educated, John left a career in finance and government to become a monk in an abbey near Jerusalem. He wrote many hymns as well as theological works. Foremost among the latter is a work called *The Fount of Wisdom*, which touches on philosophy, heresy, and the orthodox faith. This summary of patristic theology remained influential for centuries.

December 6 - Nicholas, Bishop of Myra d. ca. 342

Though Nicholas is one of the church's most beloved saints, little is known about his life. In the fourth century he was a bishop in what is now Turkey. Legends that surround Nicholas tell of his love for God and neighbor, especially the poor. One famous story tells of Nicholas secretly giving bags of gold to the three daughters of a father who was going to sell them into prostitution because he was unable to provide dowries for them. Nicholas has become a symbol of anonymous gift giving.

December 7 - Ambrose, Bishop of Milan d. 397

Ambrose was a governor of northern Italy and a catechumen when he was elected bishop of Milan. He was baptized, ordained, and consecrated a bishop all on the same day. While bishop he gave away his wealth and lived in simplicity. He was a famous preacher and is largely responsible for the conversion of Augustine. He is also well known for writing hymns. On one occasion, Ambrose led people in a hymn he wrote while the church in which they were secluded was threatened by attack from Gothic soldiers, who turned away, unwilling to attack a congregation that was singing a hymn. Ambrose is credited with authorship of three hymns in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, including "Savior of the Nations, Come" (*ELW 263*).

December 13 - Lucy Martyr d. 304

Lucy was a young Christian of Sicily who was martyred during the persecutions under Emperor Diocletian. Apparently she had decided to devote her life to God and her possessions to the poor. Beyond that, however, little is known for certain about Lucy. However, her celebration became particularly important in Sweden and Norway, perhaps because the feast

of Lucia (the name means "light") originally fell on the shortest day of the year. A tradition arose of a girl in the household, wearing a crown of candles, bringing saffron rolls to her family early in the morning on the day of Lucia.

December 14 - John of the Cross renewer of the church d. 1591 John was a monk of the Carmelite religious order who met Teresa of Ávila when she was working to reform the Carmelite Order and return it to a stricter observance of its rules. He followed Teresa's lead and encouraged others to follow her reform. He was imprisoned when he encountered opposition to the reform. His writings, like Teresa's, reflect a deep interest in mystical thought and meditation. In one of John's poems, "The Spiritual Canticle," he cried, "Oh, that my griefs would end! Come, grant me thy fruition full and free!"

December 20 - Katharina von Bora Luther

renewer of the church d. 1552

Born to an impoverished nobleman, when Katharina (Katie) was five her mother died and she was sent to live in a convent. She later took vows as a nun, but around age twenty-four she and several other nuns who were influenced by the writings of Martin Luther left the convent. Six children were born to Katie and Martin. Though initially Luther felt little affection for Katie, she proved herself a gifted household manager and became a trusted partner. She was so influential that Luther took to calling her "my lord Katie."

December 26 - Stephen *Deacon and Martyr*

Stephen was a deacon and the first martyr of the church. He was one of those seven upon whom the apostles laid hands after they had been chosen to serve widows and others in need. Later, Stephen's preaching angered the temple authorities, and they ordered him to be put to death by stoning.

December 27 - John Apostle and Evangelist

John, the son of Zebedee, was a fisherman and one of the Twelve. John, his brother James, and Peter were the three who witnessed the light of the Transfiguration. John and James once made known their desire to hold positions of power in the kingdom of God. Jesus' response showed them that service to others was the sign of God's reign in the world. Tradition has attributed authorship of the gospel and the three epistles bearing his name to the apostle John, as well as Revelation.

December 28 - The Holy Innocents Martyrs

The infant martyrs commemorated on this day were the children of Bethlehem, two years old and younger, who were killed by Herod, who worried that his reign was threatened by the birth of a new king. Augustine called these innocents "buds, killed by the frost of persecution the moment they showed themselves." Those linked to Jesus through their youth and innocence encounter the same hostility Jesus encounters later in his ministry.
